

Pick up your Keys

Pool and Head Keys are each available in the Shipstore. Each key has a \$20 deposit that is refunded when you return the key.

Parking Stickers

If you haven't already, please fill out your parking form and we will mail you up to 3 parking stickers (\$20 each). This is the new orange oval sticker. If you purchase a new car, *just bring us your old sticker* and we will issue a new one at no charge. The parking stickers are usually updated every 5 years, so you do not need new stickers every year. Day/weekend passes will be available for your guests at no charge. On busy days, guests parking will be directed to building #7.

Your Boat and Dockbox Keys, please: We need to have a spare set of your keys and/or combination to your boat in order to move the boat in the event of an emergency. When we are doing dock work, we may need to remove the dockbox.

Pool Rules – **5 People MAX** in your group and the boat owner/family member must be present (Do not give your keys to neighbors or friends). <u>Click here for More of the Pool Use Policy.</u>

If you leave with your boat for 48 hours -

When you are not using your slip we make it available for transient boaters to rent on a nightly basis. If you go cruising or remove your boat from the slip for any reason for 48 hours or more, *you are required* to let us know that you will be vacating the slip. Memorial, 4th of July, & Labor Day Holidays

We hope that we will be able to fire up the grills for you this summer! Because of Coronavirus, we have canceled the Memorial Weekend Picnic. WATER LEVEL UNCERTAINTY...

This is a very good explanation from EGLE:

High water levels have taken a toll across Michigan and it doesn't look like it's going to get any better this year.

We've gone from record low lake levels six years ago to record highs in record time. That has had a devastating impact on homes, shorelines, parks, even campgrounds. It also threatens key infrastructure such as wastewater treatment facilities and roadways across the state.

At our recent Michigan High Water Coordinating Summit, which brought together state agencies, emergency managers, federal partners, and organizations representing local government officials, we heard scary numbers about how saturated our state is. Michigan is in the middle of the wettest one-year, three-year, and five-year periods since records began 125 years ago. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers said the Great Lakes recently had the largest 24-month rise in the period on record. And, it's been the wettest September through December on record, according to the National Weather Service.

We're seeing the impact across the state. More water has flowed past Grand Rapids down the Grand River in the first four months of the current water year — which started in October 2019 — than usually passes through in an entire year. The situation is similar on the Tittabawassee River near Midland, the Manistee near Traverse City, and the Manistique in the Upper Peninsula.

High Water Issues to look out for:

Please be aware of some high water safety issues:

- -Slippery Docks & Sidewalks
- -We added some "speed bumps" at the entrance to the main parking lot. Vehicles with low ground clearance (sports cars) may want to park in a different parking lot.
- -Electricity in the water. **No swimming off** your boat/docks at marinas

-The pilings are not as tall as they once were, so be aware that if your rub-rail is higher than the piling then it will not keep your boat from getting damaged.

More Water = More Work

And more headaches too! With the high water levels, our crew and other trades professionals have been very busy raising docks and infrastructure to try to be ready for this year's record water levels. Our two main dock carpenters, Jose and Eric, have been raising docks for nearly 12 months in a row. At times, there has been a crew of 6 carpenters raising the docks. A-dock was raised this winter and new electric installed. The Fuel Dock construction is nearly complete. It was raised higher, with new fuel, electric, and water lines installed.

Specialty Concrete (Doug, E-9) has had a 4 person crew here for the last couple of months forming up concrete for the new higher seawall, sidewalks, and additional flood controls. They did a great job! Hersch Electric has had a crew of 6 electricians working on upgrading and raising much of our electrical distribution system. When 6 electricians wasn't enough, Hoekstra Electric (Paul, now B-5), sent a couple more electricians over to help us *Get-The-Job-Done*. Additionally, we raised water lines and are currently raising the grade of the playground. We also hope to complete some parking lot work this year, but that process has been slow going because of permitting and Covid.

Michigan Shipwrecks Website...

From the DNR: The Great Lakes surrounding Michigan provided a blue-water highway for trade, transportation and commerce long before Europeans arrived in North America. They were essential to Michigan lumbering, mining and industry, but shoals, storms and human error could bring disaster to ships and their crews. Today, the lakes' cold, fresh waters preserve hundreds of shipwrecks — time capsules waiting to be explored by divers, kayakers and snorkelers.

In 1980, Michigan adopted laws protecting the shipwrecks on its Great Lakes bottomlands in order to ensure that they remain for future generations to study and enjoy. It also created a system of volunteermanaged Underwater Preserves. Today there are thirteen preserves around the state. One, Thunder Bay, was designated a National Marine Sanctuary in 2000. All the preserves invite you to explore with your eyes and leave with your pictures and memories. To bring up anything else, or move anything, without a permit is to break the law.

For those who prefer to stay dry, there are glass-bottom boat tours, museums and interpretive trails with the dramatic and sometimes tragic stories of sailors and their ships.

DNR Outdoorsy Classes...

Did you know that the DNR offers many classes to help you enjoy the outdoors and our great parks, lakes, and streams? They call it the Outdoor Skills Academy and there are many classes that revolve around fishing & hunting, but there are others like *Wildflower Photography* and *Attracting Butterflies with Native Plants*. The MDNR states, "We offer expert instruction, gear and hands-on learning for a range of outdoor activities, from hunting and fishing to hiking, birding and much more.

Classes explore each topic in-depth, for a full day or more, with knowledgeable and skilled instructors leading the way. Participants will receive a certificate of completion for each class, with special recognition for Outdoor Skills Academy "graduates" who complete multiple classes. Both beginners and those with more experience are welcome. Most of these in-depth classes are designed for adults, youth ages 16 and older, and children over 10 who are accompanied by an adult." Free Boating Safety Classes!

From the MDEQ: In Michigan, boaters born after June 30, 1996, must have a boating safety certificate to operate a boat, and boaters born after Dec. 31, 1978, need a boating safety certificate to operate a personal watercraft. "If you're on the water operating a boat, or even a canoe or kayak, it's your responsibility to do so safely," said Lt. Tom Wanless, DNR Law Enforcement Division. "We strongly encourage new boaters to take a boater safety course, so they are aware of the do's and don'ts of the water. Even if you have been on the water for years, it's important to refresh yourself on the latest regulations." The DNR offers boating safety education as a self-paced, online course and as a traditional classroom experience. Learn more or register for a class at the DNR boating safety certificate webpage. 

Thanks to new technology, you can now get up-to-date wind speed, water and air temperature, wave height and more, by texting a buoy — yes, a buoy! By simply texting 734-418-7299 or 734-201-0750 with the ID of one of the 68 buoys that are part of the Great Lakes Observing System. The Holland/Port Sheldon Buoy ID is 45029.

There are 20 weather buoys on Lake Michigan providing real-time critical data to fisherman, sailors, boaters and even beachgoers (rip current potential for beach activities). An index of all the Great Lakes buoys is at https://glbuoys.glos.us/. The Port Sheldon location has been one of the most active buoys on Lake Michigan.

Plan Ahead for Cruising...

When you leave, your slip becomes available for nightly rental and you are required to let us know if you will be away from the slip for 48 hours. We already have a waiting list of transient boaters and we need your cooperation in order to provide them dockage. And hopefully, when you go cruising, your destination will be trying hard to find you a slip!

I would like to share a few good boating tips acquired from the wisdom and experience of Sea Tow captains:

One of the most common mistakes that boat operators make is not having the shifter in neutral. Most boats will not start if the shifter is in gear and this can happen very easily with people moving around the boat. So if the boat will not start check the shifter first. Also, if the boat has a safety lanyard make sure it is connected.

Another common problem is running out of fuel. Many boaters don't always top of their fuel tanks and this can lead to confusion over how much fuel is in the tank. Fuel gauges are often very unreliable in terms of accuracy. One good idea is to keep a fuel log. By knowing the capacity of your fuel tank, how many hours the engine has been run, and the average number of gallons you burn per hour, you will have a good idea of how much fuel you have left. Remember the golden rule of fuel use while boating: use 1/3 of your fuel for the trip out, 1/3 for your trip in, and keep 1/3 in reserve for the unknown.

I hope you have an enjoyable and safe boating season. If I can be of any help with the purchase or sale of your boat don't hesitate to stop by or give me a call.

An Asian Carp Update...



The battle to control the spread of Asian Carp continues. Michigan recently pledged \$8 Million to build a new Asian Carp barrier at the Brandon Lock & Dam in Illinois. While prevention controls continue to be built to keep the Carp from entering the Great Lakes waters, additional fishing efforts are being made to reduce the quantity of Carp that may headed towards the Great Lakes. Although it is used elsewhere, the haul seining or beach seining method for netting Asian Carp is now being tested in Kentucky for the first time. The 48 hour test netted about 60,000 lbs of Asian Carp! One reason for testing is to ensure that other fish populations are not endangered. Amazingly, only 10 game fish were caught in the nets and all of these fish were successfully released. Click here for the article from Quimby's Cruising Guide.

Larson, Striper, & Rinker Discontinued

Polaris purchased these brands just over a year ago but has been unable to make a go out of it and will be discontinue manufacturing. It certainly sad to see some popular and once successful brands disappear; I wonder how much of an influence the trade wars and Coronavirus pandemic had them? Unfortunately, these boats are built Syracuse, Indiana and 120 jobs will be lost at that plant. Polaris will continue to build the Bennington, Hurricane, and Godfrey boat lines at their Elkhart, Indiana plant and relocate many jobs there. If you are not familiar with these boat lines, a quick review suggests that the Pontoon and Deck boats are money makers, while small fishing and family cruisers are not.




















The Garden of Earthly Delights (on water)...

In this Art-meets-Boat-Parade experience in the Netherlands, the 500 year old artwork of Hieronymus Bosch is transformed into a piece of contemporary art; its part performance art, part kinetic sculpture, & part art happening. From Colossal.com: "A floating parade dedicated to painter Hieronymus Bosch honors the artist's fascination with the fantastical and absurd in an annual event that embodies his philosophy and aesthetic. The 2019 occurrence of the Bosch Parade included a musical performance played on a partially submerged piano and a scene with two people straddling enormous horns, just two of fourteen vignettes devoted to an evolving story about "power and counterforce, battle and rapprochement, chaos and hope."

"Bosch is known for his symbolic paintings often tying in gruesome representations of the afterlife and human desire and fear. He is also regarded as one of the earliest genre painters, depicting common people and their everyday experiences. The annual Bosch Parade is described by organizers as "a theatrical and musical art spectacle on water," drawing thousands of visitors to the southern city of 's-Hertogenbosch in the Netherlands, where Bosch was born and eventually got his name from."

The next parade kicks off on June 17, 2021. Is it time to start designing your new floating sculpture?
